

We have another big year ahead of us, with continuing improvements being done to the club, a new sub club, International Practical Shooting Confederation (IPSC) and some big changes coming to the website.

I would also like to thank everyone who showed up for the work bee, this has got to be the biggest turnout I've ever seen for a work bee. To the Cadets who picked rocks, garbage and debris all I can say is "WOW!" you guys did an amazing job. Those ranges look phenomenal. The guys building the target backers, again, thank you, you guys did an excellent job pounding those things out. Hopefully they last a bit longer than the corplast ones have. The archery guys got a lot done on their trails, and while I didn't get up there, I'm told they are happy with what they got done. Will Dueck and his cool machine definitely made the job of moving gravel a lot easier! It's really appreciated when a member will volunteer their own time, plus machine time, that is just awesome. We managed to get about 1/3 of the Range 3 backstop covered in belting, so we'll need to get more of that belting before we can put anymore up. A huge "Thanks" to Mainland Sand and Gravel for donating not only the 3/4 Road Mulch and the sand we used, but also for the belting. We'll be needing to get a group together to go up to their pit soon to roll more of that belting up as we need about another 400ft of it to finish the ranges. A few changes are coming this year, we voted in a new set of rules for the range, which will be going on the website as well as onto the new membership forms, please read them carefully and make sure you understand them. As we grow as a club, new issues pop up that we need to deal with quickly, before they become hazards, hopefully these new rules do that without making things to onerous for people to follow. Also this year you will be able to renew online for the first time ever. Our website will have the option of renewing with a credit card, and you'll get your new sticker in the mail, or in person at the club. As well we will have a credit card/debit machine available at the club for new memberships and renewals, something that people have been asking for years. You will also notice two new areas on the membership form this year, one is the Work Bee Fee area and the other is the "What can you do to help the club" area. The Work Bee Fee (WBF) is \$25 and is to encourage people to come out and help out at Work Bee's. If you make the commitment to come out, you don't pay a fee, but that means we need to see you out for at least 6-8 hrs worth of helping in a year. If you can't commit to that, then you pay \$25 up front to cover us having to hire someone (which we do far too much of) to do jobs our members could do. We will be tracking attendance at our WB's, so please make sure you sign in when you do attend.

If you make the commitment to show up, but don't, come next year's renewal you'll be charged that \$25, plus you'll be expected to pay in advance for the new year. So please, try to come out, Work Bees are normally held on the 2nd Sunday of each month throughout the year, the website will tell you for sure. The "What can you do for the club" section is simply a place to let us know if you have a special skill set that the club could use, electricians, machine owner/operators, carpenters etc. We aren't expecting you to come out for free every time, but any help you can give us would be appreciated. As well we would rather support member's businesses and companies whenever possible too. I'm sure that some of the changes may not please some people, please do not hesitate to send me an email if you have something to say. I'd rather people contact me directly than hear it through the grapevine.

Once a month, eight air cadets, one range safety officer/marksmanship coach, and a biathlon/marksmanship coach come out to the Abbotsford Fish and Game Club from 828 Hurricane RCACS (Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron) in Delta.

FISHING REPORT



Fishing Report April 2011 A good news story about our environment by Mark Hume from The Globe and Mail. Wildlife

How the Coho returned to the Tsolum River

To restore the river they first had to go to the top of the mountain. It was a long, exhausting journey that involved countless planning meetings, but in the end the Tsolum River Restoration Society succeeded in winning provincial government support for a \$4.5-million project to seal an old mine on Mount Washington that was generating acid rock drainage. Now the river is springing back to life. The Mt. Washington Copper Mining Co. only operated from 1964 through 1966, excavating copper ore on a small 13 hectare site, near Courtenay, on Vancouver Island. But when the bankrupt company abandoned the mine, it left behind 940,000 tonnes of waste rock - and a toxic legacy that for the next 44 years brewed sulphuric acid, which in turn leached copper and other heavy metals from the slag. The pollution went into Pyrrhotite and Murex Creeks, and from there into the Tsolum River. Salmon runs were already depressed by the mid-1960s because of logging damage. The acid rock drainage kept them from recovering, by impairing the development of young salmon and by forcing adult salmon to turn away from the river when they returned to spawn."The fish would come into the river but then they would back out . . .they would avoid the system," says Jack Minard, executive director of the Tsolum River Restoration Society. By 1985, the once productive salmon river had become vacant of life. Instead of 200,000 pink salmon, 11,000 chum and 15,000 Coho, the river was down to a handful of fish. Some years no salmon came at all. And a run of 3,500 steelhead, which had reached sizes of 10 kilograms, became so rare they were thought extinct."It was this lonely, dead river," Mr. Minard said. Dead but not forgotten. Starting in the 1980s, local volunteers, led initially by Father Charles Brandt, began to work at restoring the river with the help of the federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans. At first it was thought hatcheries could restock the system. But the runs never recovered, no matter how many young salmon were introduced. One year 2.5 million pink salmon were released in the river. None came back. In 1985, a study identified the problem of acid rock drainage. The river looked beautiful, but the water was toxic. In an effort to stop the old mine from leaching poison into the river, the waste rock was gathered into a gigantic pile, mixed with lime to neutralize the acid, and covered with gravel and clay. Water quality improved, and salmon did better, but copper concentrations remained too high for fish to flourish. Searching for solutions, the Tsolum River Partnership (a coalition that involved provincial and federal government agencies, TimberWest, the Mining Association of B.C., and the Tsolum River Restoration Society) discussed possibly flooding the mine site to seal the acid-generating ore underwater; capping the mine with concrete; digging trenches to funnel water away from the site; or collecting the runoff and sending it through a pipeline to a treatment plant. But most options offered only partial solutions or weren't practical. The treatment plant, for example, would have needed to operate for centuries."Acid mines last a long time," Mr. Minard said. "The Romans mined on the Thames River and that site is still generating acid rock drainage, 3,000 years later." In 2008, the provincial government, inspired in part by a personal donation of \$50,000 from Bob Hager, approved a plan to cap the Mt. Washington site with a waterproof seal, made of polyester impregnated with bitumen. The material is rolled out like a giant carpet. It locks out water and oxygen, which generates sulphuric acid when it contacts sulphide bearing ore. The seal went on in 2009-2010 with immediate and stunning results. "We have not exceeded our target of 11 parts per billion for dissolved copper in the river since the membrane was installed," Mr. Minard said. "We have seen a substantial change. The best way to say it is now water quality is not an issue."For more than 40 years the Tsolum was toxic. Now clouds of aquatic insects, long vanished from the river, can be seen dancing over the water while schools of salmon fry dart below.Last year 1,000 adult Coho returned to spawn. "That is amazing. We haven't had those numbers since 1959," Mr. Minard said. Steelhead, thought to be extinct, are in the river again. Chum and pink salmon runs haven't rebounded yet, but young fish are thriving. Much work to repair logging damage still needs to be done, and a way to provide adequate flows in summer has to be found, but Mr. Minard is ecstatic. "It's working," he said. "The river is coming back."


